The Addison Police Department Juvenile Operations Section is comprised of 34 Juvenile Officers from several different divisions. The Juvenile Operations Section is supervised by Cathy Hundley. The Investigations division has 8 juvenile officers assigned, 1 at A.T.H.S., 1 at I.T.J.H., and 6 as investigators. Three Juvenile Officers are assigned to the the Crime Prevention Section. Two Juvenile Officers serve in the Traffic Unit. The remainder of Juvenile Officers are assigned to the Patrol Division.

This year the Juvenile Officer Proficiency Examination was conducted in November/December of 2010. All listed officers qualified for their specialty pay. The total number of officers to receive specialty pay, including the juvenile specialist Sergeant is 34.

The Juvenile Officer Career Development Training Track is located in Module 17 of the Addison Police Department Career Track Training plan. After discussion with Staff and the Juvenile Officers it was recommended that three courses be added to the plan and one be removed.

Courses Added:

Child Abuse Investigation- John Reid (16 hours).

Gang Enforcement Skills Program- NEMRT (40 hours).

Communicating with Youths and Their Families-NEMRT (8 hours).

Course Removed:

Child Abuse Awareness for Patrol-NEMRT (8 hours). This class is required in another module for patrol officers.

Meetings:

There was a Mandatory Juvenile Officers meeting held on March 17, 2010. The Career Track training plan for the position of Juvenile Officers was discussed. The Juvenile Station Adjustment process was discussed and a committee was formed to create new Station Adjustment forms.

Sgt. Hundley met with Wendy Nussbaum for Social Services in May to discuss their role and assistance in tracking Station Adjustments.

Sgt. Hundley was asked to participate in the Lutherbrook Community Program Council and attended meetings in March, September, and December.

The annual Juvenile Officers meeting was schedule on two dates during November and December. Guest speakers from the DuPage County Juvenile Probation, Social Services, the DuPage County Children's Center, and the DuPage County Youth Home presented information to the officers. The annual proficiency test was given.

Community Events:

On March 29, 2010, Juvenile Officers and other department employees attended a Holiday Easter event at Lutherbrook.

On May 19, 2010, Juvenile Officers attended a talent show held at St. Paul Church for Lutherbrook residents.

June 22, 2010, Juvenile Officers assisted in staffing the Oxford Safety Days.

On November 20, 2010, Juvenile Officers attended a holiday event at Lutherbrook.

On December 8, 2010, Juvenile Officers attended the Lutherbrook Lites holiday concert.

Alternatives to Court Referral:

Peer Jury

Beginning in 2007 the Addison Police Department implemented a Peer Jury program that enhanced the services provided by the Village of Addison Police Department. This has been a very successful program and several Juvenile Officers are involved with this program. The Peer Jury program handled 6 cases this year.

Station Adjustments

There has been substantial progress made in regards to the use of this program which was rarely used. During 2010, Juvenile Officers received training on this topic at two separate departmental juvenile officer meetings. It was collectively decided in an effort to reduce juvenile crime and recidivism, this option would be used more often as the Juvenile Officer would have more frequent and positive contact with youth after an offense has been committed and this could be used as a learning tool. Juvenile Officers completed 6 Formal Station Adjustments and 2 Informal Station Adjustments.

Goals for 2011

- 1. To encourage and mentor each Juvenile Officer assigned to the patrol division to attend and participate in at least one event that builds relationships or educates the youth of the community and promotes a positive image of the police department such as Shop With a Cop, Lutherbrook events, D.A.R.E. Lock-in, Henry Hyde Resource Center events, Student Participation Center events, and Oxford Safety Days.**
- 2. To have at least three Juvenile Officers attend training and provide feedback to other Juvenile Officers in regards to De-Escalating Juvenile Aggression.**
- 3. To provide Roll Call training to all Juvenile Officers in regards to Juvenile Law Updates of January 2011.**
- 4. When manpower allows, have Juvenile Officers assigned to the patrol division attend Peer Jury sessions.**
