Normandy Watch Area

Unknown offender (s) damaged a vehicles drivers side window which was parked at the 400 block of Myrick Ave. After the alarm was activated, the glove box and center console were open but nothing appeared to be taken.

College & Meadows Watch Area

Giuseppe Nitti of Carol Stream was charged with Operation of Uninsured Motor Vehicle/Disobeying Traffic Control Device/Warrant Service at Lake and Swift. Nitti was stopped for disobeying a traffic control device. Nitti also had a warrant out of Dupage County.

Chase Mosby of Maywood was charged with Driving While License Suspended/Operation of Uninsured Motor Vehicle/No Registration Light at College and Swift. Mosby was stopped for no rear registration light, his driving privileges were found to be suspended and he had a failure to appear warrant out of Dupage County.

Derrick Lacy of Addison was charged with Aggravated Battery, Fleeing and Eluding, Aggravated Assault, Improper Lane Usage, Disobeying Traffic Control Device and Failure to Wear Seatbelt at Lake and Swift. Lacy was stopped for traffic offenses, when he fled the scene at a high rate of speed, almost injuring two officers. A warrant was issued and Lacy was arrested by Dupage County Sheriff Deputies.

Ashour Youkhanna Chamoun of Niles was charged with DUI/Driving while License Suspended at Greenbriar and Lake St. During a traffic stop, Chamouns driving privileges were found to be suspended. It was later determined that Chamoun was driving under the influence of alcohol.

Park View Watch Area

Lionel Morris of Addison was charged with Criminal Trespass to Motor Vehicle at the 200 block of Park View Dr. Morris was charged after taking the victims vehicle without permission.

Briar Hill Watch Area

At the 700 block of Briar Hill a complainant reported receiving a suspicious phone call. The caller claimed to be the complainants grandson and stated he was in an accident, was in trouble and needed money wired to England as soon as possible. The complainant recognized it as a scam and proceeded to advise the caller to call someone else and hung up the phone.

Business Watch Area

David Fish of Tomahawk, Wisconsin was charged with a warrant service at Speedway Gas Station at 701 E. Lake St. Fish was attempting to leave the gas station without paying for gas when he was approached by an officer. Fish was found to have a warrant out of Wisconsin.

National Youth Violence Prevention Week March 22nd through March 26th, 2010

The National Association of Students Against Violence Everywhere (**SAVE**) is proud to be a founding partner, along with the [Guidance Group](#), of the [National Youth Violence Prevention Campaign](#). The goal of this campaign is to raise awareness and to educate students, teachers, school administrators, counselors, school resource officers, school staff, parents, and the public on effective ways to prevent or reduce youth violence.

During the week of March 22nd through March 26th, 2010 people from all over the country will unite in a unique educational and awareness event focusing on effective ways to prevent and reduce youth violence. Students, educators, counselors, law enforcement officers, social workers, service organizations, faith-based groups, parents, and the public will participate in various activities to demonstrate the positive role young people can have in making their schools and communities safer.

Youth violence refers to harmful behaviors that can start early and continue into young adulthood. The young person can be a victim, an offender, or a witness to the violence.

Youth violence includes various behaviors. Some violent acts—such as bullying, slapping, or hitting—can cause more emotional harm than physical harm. Others, such as robbery, assault, or rape, can lead to serious injury or even death.

- Youth violence is widespread in the United States (U.S.). It is the second leading cause of death for young people between the ages of 10 and 24.
- 5,958 young people age 10 to 24 were murdered—an average of 16 each day—in 2006.¹
- Over 631,000 violence-related injuries in young people age 10 to 24 were treated in U.S. emergency rooms in 2007.
- Nearly 6% of high school students in 2007 reported taking a gun, knife, or club to school in the 30 days before the survey.
- An estimated 30% of kids between 6th and 10th grade report being involved in bullying.
